Introducing our new AEGIS Chair

It is an absolute pleasure to be writing this as the new Chair of AEGIS. I was raised within a boarding school and with my parents both as house parents, I came to see just how important the family environment and care is for international students.

Having built up positive relations with a number of guardians, it became clear that most of those who became trusted and took the relevant interest in the child were in fact AEGIS accredited. My interest in appropriate guardianship then increased and a few years later became I was appointed AEGIS Trustee.

The AEGIS office and Trustees have been extremely busy, and a great deal of work is being undertaken to support guardianship organisations and schools.

You may be aware that the new Boarding Minimum Standards is due for release. It is wonderful to be able to say that AEGIS has been listened to and that the area of guardianship is truly on the table at the highest level. Yasemin organised a sector meeting in January which engaged education associations, inspectorates and representations from the government. This was a great success on the back of the Independent Inquiry into Child Sexual Abuse (IICSA) in October 2019. IICSA had a spotlight on guardianship with the second phase due in May 2020. An interim report is estimated to be published in 2021 which puts forward suggestions to ministers.

To conclude, AEGIS is in a very healthy position and we will continue to make great strides through the second half of 2020. The key message really is for us to embrace our wonderful charity and look forward to working together with other organisations as we go forward. We are really positive about the future and the engagement from all our members is very important to us.

AEGIS PRELIMINARY MEMBERSHIP ACCREDITATION

New full guardianship member logo and new school member logo

AEGIS is moving into an exciting new phase and we have many plans to introduce to you over the coming months. The first of which we are pleased to be announcing here.

AEGIS Preliminary Membership Accreditation is now awarded to all guardianship organisations that have successfully completed stage one of the inspection process.

AEGIS accreditation inspections are carried out in two stages by experienced, independent inspectors who will determine if the guardianship organisation is meeting all the requirements set out in the AEGIS Inspection Handbook and Guardianship Organisation Minimum Standards (the AEGIS "Minimum Standards").

The Minimum Standards have been formally ratified by a solicitor and can be viewed as the gold standard in quality safeguarding and best practice. They form the framework of AEGIS accreditation and re-accreditation inspections.

Stage one is a rigorous scrutiny of the written policies and procedures that a guardianship organisation is required to submit to their inspector. You will now know that whenever you see the AEGIS Preliminary Accreditation logo you can be reassured that the documentation produced by this guardianship organisation is of the highest standard, that they follow safer recruitment procedures, and that they are working towards full accreditation by AEGIS.

The focus of stage two of the inspection is on the implementation of the policies and procedures and the working practices of the organisation.

Alongside this, we are introducing a new logo for our accredited guardianship organisations and school and university members. These will be sent to all members over the coming weeks. Guardianship organisations and schools who join AEGIS are showing a strong commitment to the safety and wellbeing of international students.

Academic support for guardian families

All AEGIS guardianship organisations have been offered complimentary logins for the award winning GCSE online learning platform, YourFavouriteTeacher.

YourFavouriteTeacher, recently shortlisted for Secondary School Education Resources Awards 2020, was founded in 2018 by ex -English Teacher, Kate Meeks (pictured) and is used by pupils in over 1000 schools in the UK.

Kate said:

"Our platform is used in football academies and schools across the UK – last year was our first year of results and we were delighted to see how well children who used our platform did.

When the COVID-19 outbreak started we realised that we were in a real position to help children and schools. We therefore developed a range of complimentary work booklets and courses to keep children on track. Working with AEGIS and hearing the plight of overseas students who were struggling to get home, or being subjected to two weeks in quarantine it seemed a natural step to offer our platform free to AEGIS members."

YourFavouriteTeacher has over five hundred hours of learning, delivered via online lessons and quizzes. All lessons are provided by experienced teachers and cover the entire GCSE curriculum for AQA/Edexcel Maths, English Language, English Literature and most of science. The platform works on any device, which is of particular interest at the moment given many children do not have access to their laptops or usual working environment. In response to the outbreak YFT have also produce downloadable work booklets in order to give children a break from continuously looking at the screen.

Students are able to watch and learn at their own pace, pausing when they wish. This is proving a valuable asset to those children for whom English is an additional language as online lessons can often be at a quicker pace than real lessons, due to the lack of class interruptions. Therefore the opportunity to revisit or pause learning is proving very useful.

Encourage a 'can do' mindset

Being able to self-regulate including at bedtime and manage their own time and belongings are skills that pupils will need in a boarding environment. You can help your child to prepare at home by gradually putting the onus on them to take on greater responsibilities, for example:

- Establish clear bedtime routines and encourage your child to recognise when it is time to get ready e.g. 8-8.30pm
- Encourage your child to create their own checklists
- Let them pack bags by themselves for school or days out
- Introduce sensible time limits for using electronics and ask them to 'hand in' their phone at night, explaining the importance of sleep and engaging with people around them
- Promote resilience by resisting the temptation to 'fix' every problem for them

How to prepare your child for boarding

Choosing to educate your child at boarding school is one of the most important and life-changing decisions you can make – and often it is a step into the unknown for both parent and child. Helping your child to build a realistic picture of what to expect and encouraging them to develop their own strategies to deal with the practical, emotional and social aspects of living away from home are key to a happy and successful transition.

Gather practical information

Boarding prides itself on being a holistic partnership between child, family and school - so planning ahead to ease the transition is a team effort. Today boarding schools need to be flexible in accommodating the many demands and complexities of modern family life; 'full boarding' no longer means staying away from home for months at a time and there are often several weekend exeats during term time, in addition to regular opportunities to phone home.

Reading through the school's boarding handbooks or guides well in advance will give your child a good overview of practical information.

Experience the surroundings

'Taster days' and overnight stays are an excellent way for your child to become more familiar with the school staff, routines and surroundings and will help him or her to form a more concrete idea of what to expect.

At Heathfield we establish a 'shadow system' during these early visits - they are a great point of reference for girls when they start in September. All the new cohort is welcomed to a school sleepover in June, when they mix with current boarders and get a true taste of the structure of the school day, facilities, extracurricular activities, support network and 24/7 pastoral care.

It is a great idea for parents to contact each other over the summer to arrange sleepovers, lunches or tea parties as this can really help strengthen bonds outside the school environment and boost your child's confidence prior to the start of term.

Manage emotional expectations

Pupils starting boarding school are young, and it can be sometimes the first prolonged time away from their families. Homesickness is natural and it can be reassuring for your child to know this. Sometimes your child may need to wallow in their feelings – I call this 'hippo time' – but it is crucial to help them to develop strategies to manage these emotions independently. It can be useful to introduce mindfulness activities at home in the months leading up to the start of term – where they learn to take time for themselves – such as reading, listening to music, or simply being at peace in their own space.

At Heathfield, we appoint 'big sisters' – pupils who organise activities with new boarders to encourage friendships, such as creating dances, posters, or writing letters home. We even have some cuddly dogs to stroke or walk, which contributes greatly towards positive emotional wellbeing.

Saho's speech contest

Saho came to Kingswood on a scholarship scheme from Japan. Here is her insightful entry into the school's speech contest' with...

"We come from different backgrounds, different races, and we came together with one goal... We can achieve anything if we pull together as one".

This is a quote from the captain of the Springboks, the South African rugby team after its memorable victory at the last World Cup, in my native country Japan.

What can we learn from his words?

It is said that due to the development of technology, connections between people from all over the world have become closer than ever before. More people are now working together with people from other countries. That's why I'm here in the UK, to prepare for my future, to be a global person. Personally, I was taken aback by the difference between British and Japanese culture when I came to England this summer. British people's love for having tea is infamous, so I wasn't surprised when I saw my host family drinking tea literally all the time.

However I began to realize this behavior originates from their deep-rooted and deep-seated traditions. The people in the UK value their leisure time, above anything else, and they have lots of outstanding ways in which to enjoy their lifestyle. Having a cup of tea is just one of them. It is fun to discover such differences, but as a boarding school student, I have also found it really difficult to spend time with people from different backgrounds. In Japan, we tend not to express our opinion, as we are too guarded about what we say. In contrast, in the UK, we are expected to share our point of view all the time, and it was really hard for me to get used to that. In reality, understanding others is not as easy as it sounds. Not only for us in today's society, but also for South African people in 1995. At that time, the majority of black people couldn't abide rugby as it was considered as a sport for privileged white people. The antagonism which black and white people felt for one another was strong. But, now they have changed their history. It is hard to believe from looking at the diversity of the South African rugby team today, that such a conflict ever existed. As we can see in this example, what we need is to make an effort to understand each other. It's difficult, but it's possible to change our view and accept other perspectives to work together."

The pinnacle of my time at RHS came with my appointment as Head Boy, which has given me a precious chance to take up more responsibility and develop my leadership skills. Louise



He has also won the Yeovil Badminton Club Under 19 Junior Tournament at Westlands Sports & Fitness Club in Yeovil; and the Sherborne Doubles tournament.
